BURLINGTON, MA & MIAMI, FL (September 16, 2024) — The Massachusetts Down Syndrome Congress and Best Buddies International, two powerful organizations with similar missions to provide essential services for individuals with Down syndrome and other intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD), are proud to announce an important new collaboration.

For the past 30 years, MDSC's Parents First Call Program has provided new and expectant parents of a child with Down syndrome with access to experienced parent mentors who have been in their shoes and are equipped to provide support and guidance to highly personal, sensitive questions and concerns. Upon receiving a Down syndrome diagnosis and being referred to MDSC, new and expectant parents each year are custom-paired with one of 40+ specially-trained PFC parents across the state who offer one-on-one support, accurate, up-to-date information on Down syndrome, and priceless guidance. At a highly emotional time when they are just starting their journey, PFC offers new and expectant parents customized advice and resources, including lists of recommended books, websites, potentially helpful organizations, information on how to locate medical and early intervention services as well as full access to all of the MDSC's family support, education, and empowerment programs throughout the lifespan. All resources are provided confidentially and free of charge. The National Parents First Call Center – a first-of-its-kind, comprehensive full-service professional center that serves expectant parents and medical providers as well as Down syndrome organization leaders and parent volunteers – was birthed from this unique and renowned model. The Center includes three branches: the National Prenatal First Call Center, the First Call National Training Center, and Julia's Way, support for breastfeeding babies with Down syndrome. Three decades since its inception, MDSC's still-evolving PFC Program and National Parents First Call Center continue to support, reassure, and ease parents at perhaps the most vulnerable point in their parenting journey, impacting the lives of parents and their babies with Down syndrome in a way that is both profound and enduring.

Established in 1989, Best Buddies is the largest organization dedicated to ending the social, physical and economic isolation of the 200 million people worldwide with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD).
